
Names

Description



Caribou are the only deer species in which both female and male grow antlers! Their middle body is brown. They have tan legs and antlers. Their necks are usually white.

Caribou are four to five feet long from the shoulders to their tails. The average weight for an adult caribou is 240-700 pounds! A calf can weigh up to thirteen pounds. The caribou's body is really special.

Caribou eat grass, moss, willow barrin leaves, small shrubs, berries and lichen.



Special Abilities

Caribou have adapted to survive out in the cold. Their broad hooves let them walk on through or on top of the snow. Their thick winter coats keep them warm. Caribou have hollow hair, so when they have to cross water when they migrate, their hair traps air, making them float! It is a good thing caribou have all those great adaptations to survive out in the frozen tundra!

Range and Population


The caribou live in a lot of different places. Caribou live in northern North America, Canada, Greenland, Alaska, Ellesmore (the Arctic island), and Montana. Two of the caribou subspecies are already extinct. Their names were Taranut graphti and Barren grand. In 1988, there were 472,000



caribou left. In 2006, there were only 128,000 caribou left.

Threats

There are many threats to the caribou. One of the threats is climate change. There is global warm-

ing, which is causing more freezing rain, which makes it harder for caribou to get to their food because they need to migrate to get their food. The caribou's main predator is humans. Humans are also damaging the caribou's habitat by logging and building more and more roads. Snowmobiles are also driving caribou out of their habitat. If these threats don't stop coming, the caribou's population will keep going down.
